SIGNALS FROM THE FLAG BRIDGE

Dear Shipmates:

We continue to make fine progress in advancing our goals, preparing for emergency response, training and enhancing maritime defense in our region. As we grow, there are many opportunities for positions for both leadership commissioned officers and enlisted. NYSMEBS, our New York State Military Emergency Boat Service, has been on mission for more than 1,100 days since it was established in late 2001. It has made over 15,000 trips transporting more than 37,000 Naval Militia and Army National Guardsmen patrolling New York's waterways. More than 130,000 total working hours have been expended in covering some 23,000 nautical miles conducting patrols waterways and security areas. This effort has added greatly to protecting New York's waters and preparing for many contingencies. We, under the direction of our Adjutant General, Maj Gen Thomas P. Maguire Jr., continue to work closely with the Coast Guard in its homeland security mission.

Due to our success, the State has authorized the acquisition of three more state-of-the-art patrol boats, which will be added to our program later this year. Please contact Major Bill Lochridge, OIC, NYSMEBS, at 914-260-4847 for training and job opportunities as a crewmember.

We are pleased to write about our own BM1 Beth Spain, who is now in Kuwait along with several other NYNM members including those who served on the Privateer (NYSMEBS). This past month she passed the Board for Coxswain with weapons earning the title of Boat Captain in the USNR. So, not only is she the first female Boat Captain for NYNM, but she is also the first female Boat Captain in Inshore Boat Unit (IBU) history! She writes to us expressing her desire to get back to our NY State missions. She has learned a lot from her deployment and wants to share it with other members of NYSMEBS upon her return. She is indeed very special and we are extremely proud of her.

To further enhance maritime safety and security, the Coast Guard is going underwater using divers, remotely operated vehicles and sonar, to detect such threats as swimmers, divers and explosive devices.

The underwater port security system (UPSS) has a capability that allows the Coast Guard to communicate with suspicious divers or swimmers and eventually it will have a non-lethal weapons capability that will convince a suspect to go away. As VADM Harvey Johnson said, "We're narrowing the gap as to providing the best possible security for our nation's ports."

The system is deployed by Coast Guard maritime safety and security teams and is made up of two components: an anti-swimmer detection system and an underwater inspection system

The inspection system relies on Coast Guard divers and remotely operated vehicles to conduct hull and pier inspections and do bottom searches.

The anti-swimmer portion employs shore-based and ship-based sonar to determine whether a target is a diver, swimmer or sea creature. It also includes an underwater communications system to send warnings and instructions - in several languages - to unidentified divers.

Port security has been a primary homeland security concern since Sept. 11, 2001 because the nation's ports, with their open architecture and unsecured waterfronts, were considered vulnerable to attack.

Special Coast Guard law enforcement teams focusing in part on underwater security are also being set up in 13 ports nationwide.

On 4 February 2005, we participated in an official visit and Naval Militia briefing for Maj. Gen. Bruce Tuxill, the Adjutant General of the State of Maryland. The Maryland Military Department consists of the Maryland Army National Guard, Maryland Air National Guard, Maryland Emergency Management Agency and Maryland Defense Force. He was accompanied by a delegation from Maryland, which consisted of Col. Edward A. Leacock, Assistant Adjutant General of Maryland, CSM David Corkran, Maryland Army National Guard, COL James Grove, J-3 Maryland (MSCA), Mr. Vic Macias, Director of Legislative Affairs / Maryland, Dr. John R. Schindler, Navy Liaison / Maryland and Maj John Tracy, JAG/Maryland.

This official visit was the result of an invitation by Maj Gen Thomas Maguire, TAG because of the strong interest and desire by Maryland to reestablish their Naval Militia. We have been assisting them prior to the meeting. It is our policy to be helpful and informative about the Naval Militia to all states that inquire about our program and ask for assistance in establishing their own. We are very

honored to be recognized and we look forward to welcoming Maryland into the Naval Militia Family. We must all work closely together to strengthen our maritime homeland defense and emergency response. Our thanks to BGen Bob Wolf, NYNM, CAPT Barry Morgan, Mr. Kevin Ettrich, LT Phil Kalisz NYNM, YNCS Adrienne Daniels NYNM and the many others who helped make this visit a success.

We welcome aboard Captain Timothy P. Crowley (USCGR) as our new Coast Guard Liaison Officer relieving Captain Mike Moriarty (USCGR). Captain Crowley recently assumed duties as the Senior Reserve Officer at Coast Guard Activities New York, the Coast Guard's largest operational command, based at Fort Wadsworth on Staten Island, NY. The Activities New York command comprises more than 600 active, 400 reserve and 1900 auxiliary personnel accomplishing all Coast Guard missions from Sandy Hook, New Jersey, through New York Harbor and up the East River and the Hudson River to the Canadian Boarder. Prior to his assignment to Activities New York, Captain Crowley served from August 2001 as a Political-Military Planner for the

Latin American Division, Strategic Policies and Plans Directorate (J-5), Joint Chiefs of Staff, Departments of Defense, where he provided political-military advice on a wide range of issues affecting the Latin-American region focusing on maritime and homeland security issues.

Captain Crowley was recalled to active duty after the September 11th terrorist attacks and served as the Coast Guard's Liaison to the Mayor of the City of New York and the New York City Office of Emergency Management. He was transferred to the Pentagon where he served as the Coast Guard's Liaison to the Department of Defense's (DOD) National Military Command Center (NMCC) during Operations Enduring Freedom and Noble Eagle. He was then assigned to Office of Defense Planning at USCGHQ to work on the Coast Guard's plans and policies for its emerging homeland security missions, including development of Maritime Security Levels (MARSECs). Captain Crowley was released from active duty in July 2002 but returned for a three month assignment in February 2003 as the J-5 Liaison to the DOD's NMCC during Operation Iraqi Freedom.

Captain Crowley received his commission in December 1980 after

graduating from United States Merchant Marine Academy at Kings Point, New York. He served the next 10 years on active duty, first as a marine inspector/investigator with the Marine Inspection Office, New York and then as the Assistant Chief of the Regional Examination Center.

Captain Crowley was employed as a Trial Attorney with the U.S. Department of Justice, Antitrust Division, as a Litigation Associate at the maritime law firm of Palmer, Biezup & Henderson and as a Deputy Attorney General and then Assistant Section Chief of the Employment Litigation and Counseling Section of the New Jersey Attorney General's Office. He currently serves as the General Counsel/Deputy Attorney the New Jersey General for equivalent of the Department of Homeland Security, located within the New Jersey Office of the Attorney General, a position he earned in November 2002.

Captain Crowley is married to the former Lorraine T. Gannon of Setauket, New York. They have twin daughters and a son: Megan 16, Katelyn 16, and Christopher 10.

We thank Captain Moriarty for his extraordinary accomplishments and efforts during the approximately 2-1/2 years he served with the NYNM. He will always be a part of our New York Navy Family. We wish him well on his new assignment as Deputy Chief of Staff for Atlantic Area in Portsmouth, Va.

Captain Crowley will be assisted by CAPT Pete Sammis, USCGR and CDR Frank Orlando, USCGR (Ret) in our long efforts to maintain a very close working relationship with our Coast Guard.

Admiral Thomas H. Collins, Commandant of the U.S. Coast wrote to Guard, recently expressing appreciation for efforts and acknowledging change in NY State Law, which now permits a Coast Guard, Marine Corps or non-line Navy Officer to serve as the Commander of the NY Naval Militia in the future. The new law also expands the requirements to maintain a close liaison with the Commandant in addition to the Secretary of the Navy.

Our appreciation goes to Governor Pataki, and Maj Gen Thomas Maguire, TAG, the NY State Legislature for supporting this initiative and especially RDML Vincent Leibell, NYNM and CDR Michael Nozzolio, NYNM for guiding this important matter to a successful conclusion.

Our future plans include a desire to work closely with the Coast Guard Auxiliary. Thanks to CDR Steve Biro, NYNM and also a member of the Auxiliary for his efforts to make this important step happen. The US Coast Guard Auxiliary is composed of uniformed, non-military volunteer civilians who assist the Coast Guard in all of its varied missions, except and direct military enforcement. These men and women can be found on the nation's waterways, in the air, in classrooms and on the dock, performing maritime domain awareness patrols, safety patrols, vessel safety checks and public education.

The US Coast Guard Auxiliary was founded in 1939 by an Act of Congress as the US Coast Guard Reserve and re-designated as the Auxiliary in 1941. Its 35,000 members donate millions of hours annually in support of Coast Guard missions. We also desire to create mutual assistance auxiliary force of boats from municipal and state agencies and authorities to join with **NYSMEBS** in time emergency. We are working to strengthen our arrangements for regional maritime defense.

Planning is underway for our 18th Annual NY City Fleet Week. Sailors and Marines Guardsmen have made a port call to the Big Apple for the annual event since 1984. Fleet Week, which is planned around Memorial Day weekend, offers an opportunity for New Yorkers to interact with the visiting service members through tours, demonstration, community outreach. "New York City has always been a favorite portof-call for the navy," said Rear Admiral Jeffrey B. Cassias, Navy Region Northeast Commander last

"We want to make sure...the community is involved," said Lt Col Williams, Fleet Kevin Week Representative from Marine Forces Atlantic. More than 70,000 people visited with service members during Fleet Week tours and events last "New York vear. City unbelievably supportive of the military," said Williams. Fleet Week demonstrates to civilians and service members that support goes both ways.

I am personally very proud of my involvement in the first and many Fleet Week events thereafter. I consider myself as on original "plank owner".

Our compliments, prayers and good wishes to the 42nd Infantry Division of the NY Army National Guard. They will become the first full Guard Division to be deployed into combat since the Korean War. Their Commander, MG Joseph Taluto, led troops that deployed to Manhattan after the September 11, 2001 terrorist attacks.

As more of our National Guard troops are activated for federal requirements, our NYNM becomes even more important to support state military force needs. What you are doing as a member of the NYNM is more important and needed. Some 45% plus of our Reserves and National Guard have been activated.

'High demand' IRR sailors to muster - about 2,000 members of the Navy's Individual Ready Reserve, sailors and officers who have served the active-duty portion of their contract but still have time left on their overall contract, will be ordered to muster at Naval Reserve centers around the country starting in April. Navy officials describe the muster as a routine administrative measure, saying it's not a prelude to an involuntary mobilization. So far, the Navy has not ordered anyone from the IRR back onto active duty. But since the Sept. 11th terrorist attacks, 400 Navy people have voluntarily come back onto active duty from the IRR, officials said. the majority of those selected for muster this fiscal year are sailors with ratings - and officers with designators - in the following communities and specialties:

- Cargo handling.
- Seabees.
- Explosive ordnance disposal.
- Naval coastal warfare.
- Special warfare.
- Judge Advocate General's Corps and Legalman.
- Masters-at-arms and sailors with the 9545 law enforcement

- specialist Naval Enlisted Classification.
- Supply Corps Officers.
- Intelligence personnel with linguistic training.
- Hospital corpsmen with the field medical service technician NEC.

Congratulations to Raymond T. Stone, author of "My Ship!" The USS Intrepid CV-11, who was the keynote speaker at the Naval Reserve Association - Ensign James F. Burke Chapter on 4 February 2005.

In April, 1943, 17 year old Ray Stone enlisted in the Navy and, after boot camp at Samson, NY, he attended radar school at Virginia Beach. Ray then joined the precommissioning crew of the USS Intrepid, an Essex class aircraft carrier being completed at the Newport News Shipbuilding Company in Virginia.

A Plankowner, one of the 3,000 men in the Intrepid's original crew, Stone served as a radarman in the ship's Combat Information Center. Stone survived one torpedo and five kamikaze hits on the Intrepid without a scratch, while 26 of his fellow radarmen were killed during the kamikaze attacks off the Philippines.

Also, a Bravo Zulo to RDML Tom Dufficy, NYNM, President of the Mess and CAPT Liam Murphy, NYNM, "Mr. Vice" who keep this great Navy tradition alive.

In addition to the topics outlined during the staff briefings as noted above, the HQ staff discussed ways to implement a NYNM program to prepare a comprehensive census of first responder/militarily useful patrol and safety craft through which would state NYSDMNA emergency planners an overview of what maritime floating resources would be available within a given area to respond to catastrophic natural or terrorist acts. The program is being designed and will take shape during the winter/spring of 2005

CHAPLIN'S CORNER

As the picture in the New York Times portrayed the Pearl Harbor Survivor Veterans and our Chaplain partaking of a memorial service on December 7th aboard the Intrepid Museum, one could not escape comparisons made with another day that shall remain in infamy, September 11, 2001. On both days, better than one half century apart, planes appeared out of a clear blue sky, in Hawaii, in New York and D.C., headed straight for American targets, successfully causing massive and dislocating destruction of national and human assets.

In both events, approximately 3,000 people were lost in smoldering fire; heavy losses inflicted upon military and economic targets. Pearl Harbor in 1941, the World Trade Center and the Pentagon in Washington D.C. on September 112, 2001, were wake up calls for a United States that should not have been asleep. Indeed, the memory of the sneak attack at Pearl Harbor, commemorated each year, suggests that our awareness of an attack in 2001 could and should have been better anticipated.

As for Pearl Harbor, war with Japan was considered a certainty by 1941. At war with China, Japan's lack of natural resources made its aggressive search for oil and iron a necessity of its foreign and military policy. By 1940, American had been increasingly placing an embargo on its shipments of industrial products to

Japan. Japan's signing to a treaty with the European axis powers put the final touches on an inevitable clash between the U.S. and Japan. Directing its aggressive and essential need for natural resources in Southeast Asia would require Japan neutralizing America's capacity to thwart its aggression. The U.S. Pacific fleet would be the target, its major strategic location Pearl Harbor.

The intelligence complacency concerning December 7 seemed destined to be echoed in the September 11 disaster. Well before 1941, the United States had broken the Japanese diplomatic code but did not exploit the messages properly. Foreshadowing the stovepipe nonsharing of intelligence by the F.B.I. and the C.I.A. prior to 2001, the Army and the Navy, prior to December 7 had decoded Japanese messages on alternate days, often not sharing new information. Just as a lower level F.B.I. agent's warning

upon the U.S.S. Cole; were theses deeds of fact and words of intend not sufficient to gear up the Homeland Defense prior to the tragedy of 9-11?

Despite the difficulties it must be remembered that the Japanese paid dearly for their war against the U.S. Likewise, the U.S. giant slept no more following 9-11, but arose up to destroy and rived out the terrorists from Afghanistan, Iraq and Saddam's chamber of horrors eliminated in Iraq.

To America's credit, it is crucial to take note of the U.S. successful role following the defeat of our enemies. Because we aided and democratized Japan following its defeat, Japan has grown to be an industrial giant. In Pearl Harbor commemorations to come it should be expressed that Japan has committed almost 500 fighting men to our war in Iraq, renewing their assignment for the coming year unlike our non participating Western

that Arabs were taking flying lessons on commercial airplanes was ignored, so too was the solid information overlooked provided by our Ambassador in Japan that an attack was imminent. Prior to September 11, there were overt signs that our mainland was in danger. Had not Osama Bin Laden issued a decree that it would please Allah if Americans, any Americans including children could be slain? Were not the murder of our people in Lebanon, the African embassies, the suicide attack

"allies."

The above analysis is especially apt for our New York Naval Militia, so many of us called to active during the World Trade Center disaster, so many of our fellow New Yorkers on duty in Afghanistan and Iraq. We salute the memories of those who gave and are giving their lives for the freedom we enjoy. God Bless them. God Bless America.

THE JUDGE ADVOCATE'S FORUM

Increased education benefits and more flexibility in awarding bonuses are among the quality-oflife improvements targeting National Guard and Reserve service members in the 2005 National Defense Authorization Act. The act, signed by President Bush Oct. 28, also provides for changes in how guardsmen and reservists are mobilized deployed.

"I am encouraged that the (Defense) Department, working with Congress, has enacted a number of provisions that will fundamentally change the nature of Guard and Reserve service," said Assistant Secretary of Defense for Reserve Affairs Thomas Hall Nov.

During an interview with the Pentagon Channel and American **Forces** Press Service, Hall explained many changes contained in the authorization act were vital to bring reserve component benefits more in line with active duty benefits, particularly since troops from both components generally serving side by side in combat zones.

"We had a much different benefit structure for the Guard and Reserve and active duty, which was all right when you're not mobilized and when you're in a drilling status," Hall said. "But when you are mobilized and you're serving ... in the foxhole alongside your active duty brethren, we have to ask, 'Are the benefits the very same?' And they haven't been."

One significant change concerns various types of bonuses and proficiency pay. The act generally doubles or triples reserve component bonuses, bringing them closer to active duty amounts. It allows re-enlistment bonuses to be paid more than once and to be paid in a lump sum.

The act also covers an accession/affiliation bonus of up to \$6,000 for reserve officers; changes rules concerning foreign-language proficiency pay, and adds a \$2,000 bonus for reserve component members who convert to a critical skill.

In the past, education benefits for reserve component troops were considerably below those for active duty troops, even when RC service members were activated for extended periods. That is now changed, based on how long a reserve member is activated, Hall explained.

Members who have been activated more than 90 consecutive days will now receive 40 percent of the active duty monthly rate under the Montgomery G.I. Bill, or \$401 a month for those attending school full time.

The rate goes up to \$602, 60 percent of the active duty rate, for those activated more than one year. For those reserve component members activated at least two years, the rate jumps to 80 percent of the active duty rate, or \$803 per month. Active duty service members must generally serve at least a four-year enlistment to earn full benefits under the Montgomery G.I. Bill.

Hall mentioned that he hopes to see education benefits increase also for those drilling reservists who aren't activated.

Other significant changes contained in this year's authorization act concern how reserve component troops are mobilized and how they're managed while they are mobilized. The act now allows the military services to mobilize their RC members for training. In the past, a common scenario was to activate guardsmen or reservists, send them away from home for training and then deploy them to an operational mission.

"Well, in many cases what that involves is that the mobilization process is not necessarily just 12 months boots on the ground," Hall explained. "It might extend up to 18 months. And, of course, that's time in which guardsmen and reservists are away from their families and employers."

New rules contained in the authorization act allow RC members to be activated just for training, then demobilized until they're needed for operational missions.

"What we hope to do is cut down the total amount of mobilization because we can do training when it's available, when the guardsman wants it and when their employer wants it," Hall said. "That is a huge change that I think will help the mobilization process. I think it's welcomed by our components, and it's welcomed by the individual guardsmen and reservists."

This authorization act also eliminates the so-called "180-day rule." Under previous accounting guidelines, reserve component service members who were mobilized for more than 179 days had to be counted against active duty statistics, Hall explained. This particularly caused problems in terms of end- strength goals and ceilings on specific pay grades.

Hall said the new rules better satisfy the needs of the reserve component and the active duty services. "The rules we had were good for another time and another place," he said. "But this is transformational; it's more integration and a great step forward.

FEDERAL LAW ENFORCEMENT FOUNDATION HONORS COAST GUARD



NAMDALSEID, Norway - The United States Marine Corps is known for making Marines and winning battles. Exercise Battle Griffin 2005 in Norway trains Marines for a different sort of battle - one against the elements.

The Marines of Marine Air Ground Task Force 25 have endured everything the Norwegian skies could throw at them - from relentless flurries of snow or sleet to well below freezing temperatures and a bitter wind chill.

"It's my first time being this cold," said Lance Cpl. Frank Lamar, a Mobile Ala. native with Combat Service Support Detachment 44. "I'd seen snow before, but the wind and the cold...it's a lot more than I expected."

To protect themselves from the harsh environment Marines drew a unique uniform issue of cold weather gear.

"Everyone's walking around in the cold weather boots. Gore-Tex and the heavyweight fleece we've issued," said Lance Cpl. Oiibwa D. Miller. warehouseman with CSSD-44. "It's not normal issue, but we've had to adapt for the exercise. There's no possible way we could've (successfully) completed this exercise without that issued gear."

The weather not only made Marines uncomfortable, it caused two MAGTF Marines to come down with a mild case of frostbite and caused several cold vehicle accidents.

"I think my Marines have developed a sense of respect for the cold weather environment," said Sgt. Maj. Patrick E. Anderson, the MAGTF sergeant major. "Its effect on their bodies and their equipment has made them think twice about coming to the field unprepared and overconfident."
